DHS Compliance Assurance Structure

CAPO conducts regulatory assessments of new projects, performs documentation-based reviews of existing programs, participates in joint inspections of select agent-registered entities with CDC and APHIS, and represents DHS in interagency discussions pertaining to oversight of biosafety and biosecurity policy. Areas of oversight include biosafety, select agent and toxin security, research involving recombinant and/or synthetic nucleic acid molecules, human subjects or animals, and compliance with the Biological and Chemical Weapons Conventions. CAPO also leads DHS efforts pertaining to life sciences dual use research of concern (DURC) and institutional DURC (iDURC).

The CAPO also provides input and analysis to the Compliance Review Group (CRG), which monitors DHS activities for biological and chemical treaty compliance, renders compliance determinations, and provides guidance on compliance issues.
