



Since 1929, Mobile Azalea Trail Maids have graced the gardens and streets of Mobile, dressed in iconic pastel dresses that flutter like the azaleas blooming in this historic city. What began as a vision of the Mobile Junior Chamber of Commerce, now the Mobile Jaycees, as a beautification project blossomed into a long standing tradition, with 10 local debutantes initially serving as hostesses.

By 1949, the first official Azalea Trail Court was formed. This inaugural court was composed of two senior girls from each of the four Mobile County high schools. Over the years, this program has continually evolved and expanded to include more young ladies, even leading to the formation of Distinguished Young Women of America, formerly known as America's Junior Miss Program. Currently, the Azalea Trail Court comprises fifty senior girls representing both public and private high schools located in Mobile County.

The Azalea Trail Court is widely recognized for representing the finest in Southern charm and hospitality, and represents Mobile year-round at hundreds of civic events. In addition, the girls are in nationwide demand and have appeared at the internationally televised Rose Bowl Parade in Pasadena, California, the nationally televised Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City, Disney's Easter Parade in Orlando, Florida, the Philadelphia Thanksgiving Day Parade, the Chicago Christmas Parade, the Indianapolis 500 Parade, the Presidential Inaugural Parade, and the 4th of July parade in Atlanta.

The city of Mobile is extremely proud of the young ladies who are chosen to be a part of this treasured tradition and serve as goodwill ambassadors for the city. They willingly and gracefully represent the city at over 400 local, state, and national events each year. They volunteer their time, engage with the community, and learn invaluable life skills that will guide them in their future endeavors. They also serve as role models for young girls in the community, inspiring them to be studious and involved, with the hope of one day continuing the legacy of this organization.
